Research shows that routines support healthy social emotional

development. When children have a predictable environment, such as a structured school day, they learn to self-regulate in organized and predictable ways. Regular school attendance encourages positive social interactions with others. Researchers have found that the lack of social interactions damages mental health. People who feel more connected to others have lower levels of anxiety and depression, have higher levels of self-esteem, and have greater empathy for others.

Please help your students to learn and succeed through daily school attendance. Bring them on time, and encourage them to take full advantage of the learning opportunities that are available to them each day.


