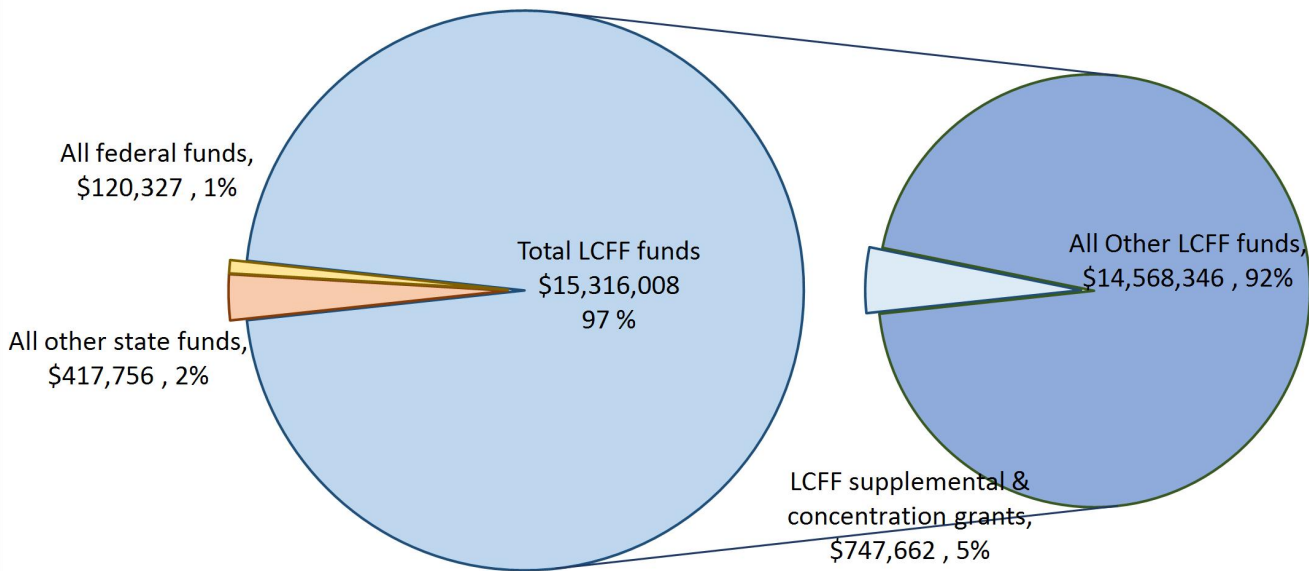

Projected Revenue by Fund Source

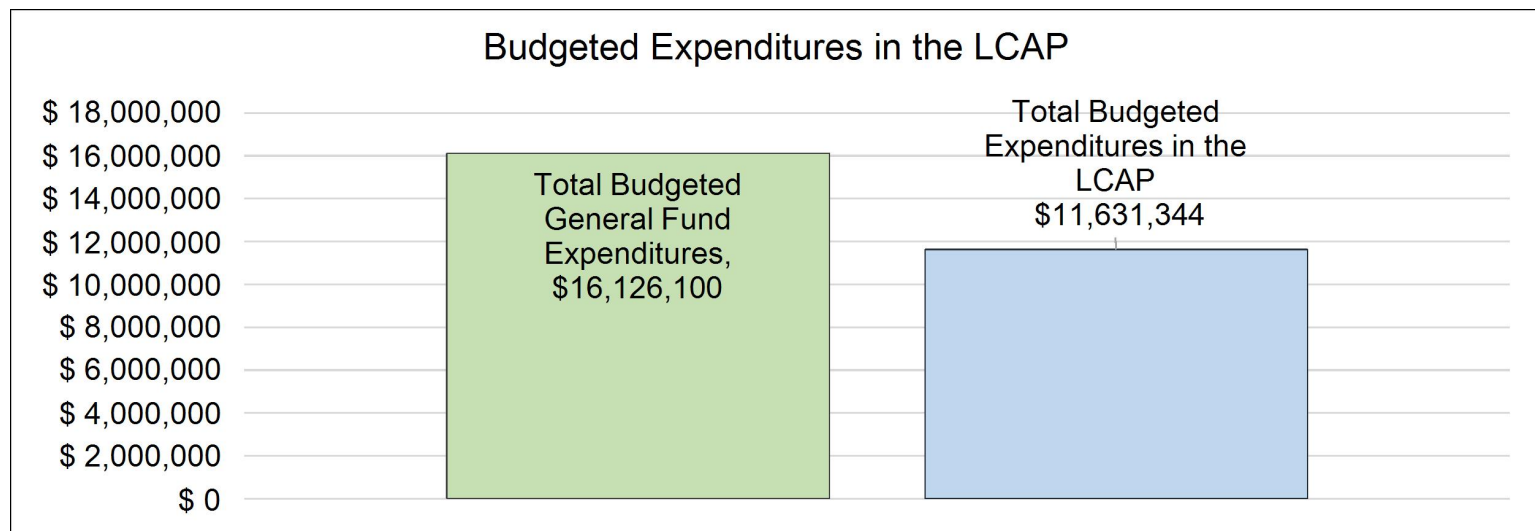


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue John Adams Academy - Lincoln expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

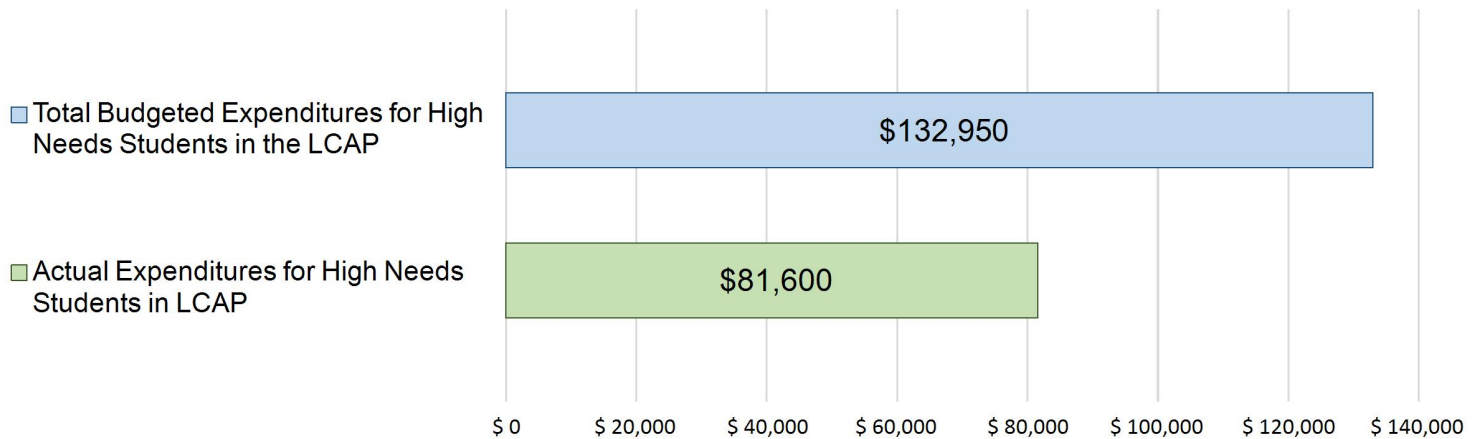

John Adams Academy is a public charter school organization that operates in Northern California, dedicated to restoring America's heritage by developing servant leaders through an American Classical Leadership Education®. The Academy serves scholars in transitional kindergarten through 12th grade, providing a rigorous, principle-based education rooted in classical learning, leadership development, and civic responsibility.

Classic Education

John Adams Academy follows a classical education model, offering a curriculum rich in the liberal arts and sciences. Scholars engage with great works of literature, history, philosophy, and Latin, fostering critical thinking, intellectual curiosity, and a deep understanding of Western civilization and its foundations. The Academy's Socratic dialogue approach encourages scholars to analyze, discuss, and apply timeless principles to modern challenges, preparing them for higher learning and meaningful engagement in society.

Leadership Training

A defining feature of John Adams Academy is its commitment to leadership development. The Academy cultivates servant leaders—individuals who lead by example and uphold the values of freedom, responsibility, and civic duty. Scholars participate in mentorship programs, public speaking opportunities, and leadership-focused coursework, empowering them to act with integrity and contribute positively to their communities.

Patriotic Education

John Adams Academy places a strong emphasis on patriotic education, integrating American history, constitutional studies, and the principles of liberty and self-governance throughout its curriculum. Scholars study the Declaration of Independence, the U.S. Constitution, and the Federalist Papers, fostering an appreciation for America's founding ideals and the responsibilities of citizenship. The Academy's goal is to instill in scholars a love for their country, a deep respect for its founding principles, and a commitment to preserving and promoting liberty.

Moral and Ethical Focus

Character development is at the heart of John Adams Academy's educational philosophy. The Academy promotes a moral and ethical framework based on classical virtues such as honesty, integrity, respect, and responsibility. These principles are woven into the academic curriculum, school culture, and daily interactions, ensuring that scholars develop both intellectual and moral excellence.

TK-12 Education and Flexible Learning Options

John Adams Academy offers a full transitional kindergarten through 12th-grade education, allowing scholars to experience a consistent and continuous academic journey from early learning through high school graduation. This structure fosters long-term relationships between scholars, families, and educators, strengthening scholar engagement and academic success. To accommodate diverse learning needs, John Adams Academy also provides an online learning program, offering flexible education options for scholars who benefit from alternative learning environments. This program ensures that scholars can still access the rigorous, principle-based education of John Adams Academy while learning in a format that best suits their individual needs.

Commitment to Excellence

John Adams Academy seeks to prepare scholars to be thoughtful, informed, and active participants in their communities and beyond. Through its classical curriculum, leadership training, patriotic education, and moral development, the Academy equips scholars with the tools to think critically, lead effectively, and uphold the principles of liberty and virtue. By fostering academic excellence and character development, John Adams Academy remains dedicated to shaping future leaders who will contribute meaningfully to society.

Reflections: Annual Performance

John Adams Academy - Lincoln remains committed to continuous improvement, as reflected in our performance on the 2025 California School Dashboard and local data. This reflection highlights our successes, challenges, and the targeted actions we are taking to address the needs of our scholars, particularly scholar groups requiring additional support.

Our Academy demonstrated stability and growth across several academic indicators. In English Language Arts, scholars performed 0.6 points above standard, maintaining a Yellow performance level and reflecting continue progress. Mathematics performance, while still below standard at 26.5 points below, improved by 4.9 points, indicating positive momentum in closing achievement gaps. These outcomes are further supported by growth data, with 68.9% of scholars improving in ELA and 67.1% in mathematics, demonstrating consistent academic progress across content areas.

English Learner progress is a notable area of strength for the Lincoln campus. 69.4% of English Learners made progress toward English proficiency, resulting in a Blue performance level and reflecting a 6.9 percentage point increase. This improvement indicates that targeted supports and instructional strategies for English Learners are yielding positive results. Additionally, science performance remains strong, with scholars performing 60.3 points above standard, demonstrating continued success in science instruction.

Despite these strengths, disparities among scholar groups persist and remain an area of focus. English Learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged scholars, and scholars with disabilities continue to perform below standard in both ELA and mathematics. For example, English Learners scored 35.5 points below standard in ELA and 49.8 points below standard in mathematics, while scholars with disabilities scored 88.1 points below standard in ELA and 111.9 points below standard in mathematics. These gaps highlight the continued need for targeted intervention and differentiated instructional support.

Attendance and school climate indicators present areas for improvement. Chronic absenteeism increased to 15.3%, placing Lincoln in the Orange performance level, with several scholar groups, including English Learners and scholars with disabilities, experiencing significantly higher rates. Additionally, the suspension rate increased to 3.3%, also resulting in an Orange performance level. These trends indicate a need to strengthen engagement, attendance systems, and behavioral supports to ensure scholars remain consistently connected to their learning environment.

At the same time, important positive outcomes are evident in secondary indicators. The graduation rate increased significantly to 97.3%, reflecting a 6.8 percentage point increase, and demonstrating strong outcomes for scholars completing high school. However, the College and Career Indicator declined to 41.7% prepared, representing a 15.5 percentage point decrease. The Academy is currently reviewing data reporting practices for this indicator to ensure that all eligible measures of college and career readiness are accurately captured, including recognition of scholars who qualify for distinctions such as the State Seal of Biliteracy and other qualifying achievements. While these outcomes may be influenced in part by data reporting factors, they reinforce the importance of continuing to strengthen systems that support long-term scholar outcomes, particularly in secondary grades.

Beginning in the 2026-27 school year, John Adams Academy - Lincoln will transition to a TK-8 program and will no longer serve high school grades. As a result, future Dashboard reports will not include secondary indicators such as graduation rate and College and Career readiness. This shift reflects a structural change in grade span rather than a change in program effectiveness, and future performance analyses will focus on elementary and middle school outcomes.

To address identified needs, John Adams Academy - Lincoln is implementing several targeted strategies. The Academy will continue to strengthen academic interventions, particularly for English Learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged scholars, and scholars with disabilities, through expanded use of data-driven instruction, targeted small-group support, and alignment of intervention systems. Efforts to improve attendance and reduce chronic absenteeism will include increased family engagement, individualized outreach, and strengthened monitoring systems.

Additionally, the Academy will prioritize improving school climate through restorative practices, proactive behavioral supports, and intentional development of scholar character aligned to the Academy's core values to reduce suspension rates and increase scholar engagement. Continued professional development will focus on differentiated instruction, responsive practices, and effective strategies for supporting diverse learners.

As we move forward, John Adams Academy - Lincoln remains dedicated to fostering academic growth while addressing areas of need through strategic, data-driven decision-making. By building on areas of strength and intentionally addressing disparities, the Academy will continue to support all scholars in achieving success and fulfilling its mission of developing servant-leaders prepared for academic and personal achievement.

Teachers	Teachers have played an essential role in the LCAP development process through professional learning communities, staff meetings, and curriculum discussions. Educators provided input on instructional needs, intervention strategies, and scholar achievement data to inform goal-setting. Feedback gathered from teachers helped identify key areas of improvement, particularly in supporting struggling scholars, implementing differentiated instruction, and integrating intervention strategies.
Administrators	Administrators, including Principals and Academic Deans, have been actively engaged in the development and refinement of the LCAP through weekly Admin Academy meetings. These meetings provide a structured forum for reviewing performance data, identifying areas of improvement, and aligning school-site strategies with academy-wide goals. Principals play a key leadership role in setting the direction for their campuses and with developing 100-day plans that directly support LCAP priorities. Academic Deans work closely with teachers to gather feedback, provide instructional coaching, and address their professional development needs. Their role in facilitating teacher collaboration, supporting intervention efforts, and ensuring high-quality instruction has been essential in shaping the strategies outlined in the LCAP. Maintaining close communication with both educators and administrators helps bridge the gap between classroom needs and school-wide initiatives, ensuring that instructional decisions are informed by direct feedback from teachers and scholars.

Additionally, our parents regularly attend monthly board meetings, where they openly share their appreciation for programs and initiatives that are working well, as well as constructive feedback on areas for improvement. This consistent engagement ensures that our decision-making process remains transparent and responsive to the needs of our families. Parent input has been instrumental in shaping strategies for improving communication, strengthening family engagement, and enhancing support for English Learners and socioeconomically disadvantaged scholars. By incorporating parent voices into our LCAP planning, we ensure that our priorities align with the needs and concerns of the families we serve. Feedback from teachers, administrators, school personnel, parents, and scholars played a critical role in shaping the goals, metrics, actions, and budgeted expenditures within our LCAP. Through structured engagement opportunities such as Admin Academy meetings, town halls, board meetings, advisory committees, and teacher collaboration sessions, our educational partners provided valuable insights that directly influenced our decision-making process. Below are specific ways their feedback impacted the development and refinement of our LCAP.

Prioritization of Academic Support and Intervention

Input from teachers and academic deans highlighted the need for additional intervention resources to support struggling scholars, particularly English Learners, scholars with disabilities, and socioeconomically disadvantaged scholars. In response, the Academy expanded intervention efforts and increased professional development opportunities. These actions were prioritized within the budget to ensure equitable access to academic supports for scholars most in need. Additionally, through meetings with EL teachers and support staff, we refined our district reclassification criteria to better align with scholar progress and state guidelines. This refinement ensures that scholars are accurately assessed for reclassification readiness, providing them with the necessary support to transition successfully out of EL services while maintaining their academic trajectory. By streamlining this process, we are reducing barriers to reclassification and increasing the effectiveness of our EL monitoring and intervention efforts.

100-Day Plans and Site-Specific Goals

Through weekly Admin Academy meetings, administrators including Principals, Assistant Principals, and Academic Deans, identified areas for targeted improvement at each school site. This led to the implementation of 100-day plans, in which each site developed data-driven strategies aligned with the Academy's broader LCAP goals. The feedback from site leadership influenced the inclusion of measurable progress indicators in the LCAP to track the effectiveness of these site-specific initiatives.

Addressing Chronic Absenteeism

Teachers and administrators frequently voiced concerns about chronic absenteeism and its impact on scholar success. Data analysis further confirmed that English Learners, socioeconomically disadvantaged scholars, and scholars with disabilities had the highest rates of absenteeism. Based on this input, the Academy expanded attendance monitoring systems, implemented scholar attendance incentives such as Perfect Attendance Awards, and strengthened parent outreach efforts to address barriers to regular attendance.

Increased Support for Teacher Development

Teachers and Academic Deans emphasized the need for enhanced professional development to support differentiated instruction, intervention strategies, and scholar engagement techniques. In response, the Academy increased investments in coaching support, collaborative professional learning opportunities, curriculum-based trainings, and training on effective instructional strategies. Funding was reallocated within the budget to provide ongoing, site-based professional development aligned with LCAP goals.

Expanded Parent Engagement Initiatives

Town hall meetings, parent advisory committees, and board meetings provided valuable insights into the need for improved communication and family engagement efforts. As a result, the LCAP includes expanded parent workshops and additional opportunities for families to participate in scholar learning experiences. These initiatives aim to strengthen home-school partnerships and increase parental involvement in scholar success.

Support for Unduplicated Scholars

Through consultation with educational partners, the Academy prioritized the expansion of programs within Foundations Expanded Learning to provide additional academic support for all scholars, with a particular focus on unduplicated scholars, including English Learners and socioeconomically disadvantaged scholars. These expanded programs offer targeted opportunities for scholars to develop core academic skills, receive homework assistance, and engage in structured learning activities that reinforce classroom instruction. Foundations Expanded Learning has plans to include additional small-group instruction and skill-building workshops designed to address learning gaps and provide enrichment opportunities beyond the regular school day. By incorporating evidence-based strategies and differentiated instruction, these programs are helping to bridge achievement gaps and support scholar success.

Adjustments to Budget and Expenditures

Through consultation with educational partners, the Academy reviewed existing actions and reallocated resources to better align with scholar needs. Some programs were expanded, while others were streamlined or adjusted based on effectiveness data. For example, professional development funding was increased to support targeted instructional coaching, while expenditures for general materials were reduced in favor of scholar-centered support programs. These adjustments ensure that resources are directed toward high-impact initiatives that align with both educational partner feedback and performance data.

Conclusion

Through meaningful collaboration with teachers, administrators, school personnel, parents, and scholars, John Adams Academy - Roseville has refined its LCAP to better address scholar needs, improve academic outcomes, and strengthen school-community partnerships. By incorporating direct feedback into the development process, we ensure that our goals, metrics, actions, and expenditures reflect the priorities and voices of our educational partners while maintaining a strategic and sustainable approach to resource allocation.

John Adams Academy developed this goal in response to the needs identified through our data analysis and input from educational partners. The scholar population has grown significantly over the past three years. That means the school has both new scholars who are unfamiliar with the Academy's academic model and processes of learning. The additional teachers required by the larger population were also new to the Academy and its program, primarily in the secondary. One impediment to improvement in math scores was difficulty in finding quality math teachers who would stay with the Academy for a few years in order to develop effectively as teachers. Moving forward, it will be a priority to find, train, and retain quality teachers, especially in math, to establish the processes and teams that will enable scholar growth. There is a clear need to continue supporting English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. Through the actions listed below ELA and Mathematics scores will show growth towards meeting or exceeding standards.

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Implementation of Goal 1 at the Lincoln campus during the 2025-26 school year was carried out with strong consistency and alignment to planned actions. A central component of implementation was the use of weekly Friday Professional Development (PD), which included both academic and behavioral supports to strengthen classroom conditions for learning. Targeted training in mathematics and the liberal arts instructional model was provided during PD and reinforced through Professional Learning Communities (PLCs). Within PLCs, teams engaged in regular data analysis and instructional planning, allowing for increased alignment to standards and clarity in instructional practices. These structures supported consistency across classrooms and strengthened the overall instructional program. The integration of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) strategies during PD also contributed to improved classroom environments, which supported academic learning. While implementation was strong overall, challenges included variability in the depth of data analysis within PLCs and the need for continued refinement of instructional practices to ensure consistent impact across all classrooms.

In the online program, implementation focused on strengthening instructional systems and academic supports to improve scholar achievement in ELA and mathematics. Program staff established measurable academic goals and engaged in ongoing monthly data review and reflection cycles to monitor scholar progress and refine instructional practices. The online program implemented mentoring cycles for teachers, strengthened PLC and grade-level collaboration structures, increased CAASPP Performance Task practice in tested grade levels, and emphasized instructional strategies aligned to the Seven Keys to Effective Teaching by Mike Schmoker. Challenges included addressing instructional alignment and responding to areas of lower performance identified through i-Ready and MAP data, particularly in the elementary grades. Successes included stronger collaboration systems, targeted intervention planning, and increased use of data-informed instructional adjustments within the online setting.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Several actions under Goal 1 were effective in promoting ELA and mathematics growth. Professional development focused on the liberal arts model and targeted math instruction improved teacher clarity and consistency in delivering standards-aligned instruction. The use of PLCs for data-driven discussions supported instructional adjustments and helped teams respond to scholar needs more effectively. The integration of PBIS strategies was also effective, as it strengthened classroom management and created conditions more conducive to learning, ultimately supporting academic outcomes. While these actions were effective, there is an opportunity to increase their impact by deepening the level of data analysis in PLCs and ensuring more consistent implementation of instructional strategies across all teams.

In the online program, instructional coaching, PLC collaboration, mentoring cycles, and regular data review processes supported continuous improvement in teaching practices and academic intervention efforts. Analysis of i-Ready and MAP data provided valuable insight into scholar performance trends and helped identify areas requiring additional targeted support in literacy and mathematics. Increased CAASPP Performance Task practice supported assessment readiness in tested grade levels. While program data demonstrated areas needing continued growth and instructional alignment, the implementation of structured intervention planning and ongoing progress monitoring improved the program's ability to identify and respond to scholar academic needs in a timely manner.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on reflection, the site will continue all current strategies under Goal 1, with targeted refinements to improve effectiveness. Professional development will be enhanced to include more structured opportunities for teachers to model, practice, and reflect on instructional strategies. PLCs will be strengthened through the use of more consistent data analysis protocols to support deeper instructional planning. Additionally, adjustments will be made based on team feedback to ensure that training and collaboration time are responsive to staff needs and lead to stronger instructional outcomes.

In the online program, several refinements are planned to strengthen scholar achievement in ELA and mathematics based on data analysis and program reflection. Beginning in the 2026–27 school year, the elementary master schedule will be revised to increase daily instructional time for mathematics. The online program will also implement a targeted intervention instructional plan, including the addition of a dedicated math and reading intervention/EL specialist to provide focused academic support for scholars. Adjustments to assessment administration timelines will better align testing windows with instructional pacing and scholar readiness. Additionally, the program is refining how scholar mastery and progress are measured through adjustments to the Canvas gradebook and implementation of Intelligent Insights reporting tools to provide more actionable academic data for instructional decision-making.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

At John Adams Academy, our goal is to restore America's heritage by developing servant leaders. In order to succeed, we believe that scholar and family engagement is paramount in this endeavor. Similarly, it is important that we can create and nurture learning environments for scholars that are safe, engaging and supportive. This goal was developed in order to fortify our school culture toward these outcomes. Our data indicates that some of our engagement and climate indicators, such as chronic absenteeism and suspension rate, could show improvement. With the great amount of enrollment growth, we want to ensure that the new scholars are being enrolled in our school's values and culture. Within the school and classroom we want to ensure that teachers know and are able to implement practices that create healthy classroom cultures and support the growth of scholars who struggle with maintaining appropriate behavior. According to our climate survey 33% of teachers requested professional development in positive behavioral support and classroom management. An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Implementation of Goal 2 focused on strengthening school culture through consistent application of PBIS strategies and alignment to the Academy's core values. Weekly PD sessions were used to provide ongoing PBIS training, ensuring that staff had regular opportunities to build understanding and reinforce expectations. These efforts resulted in increased consistency in classroom management practices and contributed to a more positive and structured learning environment. Staff engagement in PD supported a shared understanding of behavioral expectations and strengthened the overall culture of the campus. A challenge identified during implementation was the need for more opportunities for staff to actively engage with PBIS strategies beyond discussion, including modeling, practice, and reflection, to ensure deeper and more consistent application across classrooms.

In the online program, implementation efforts focused on strengthening scholar connectedness, family engagement, and staff collaboration in support of a positive school culture aligned to the academy's core values. The online program expanded communication systems through weekly parent meetings with administrators, increased use of ParentSquare and text-based communication systems, and close monitoring of family engagement with Canvas and communication platforms. Staff also maintained regular collaboration through lead teacher meetings, PLCs, and mentoring structures to support consistent implementation of program expectations and instructional practices. Challenges

included fostering connection and engagement within a virtual environment, while successes included increased communication with families and stronger systems for collaboration and responsiveness to stakeholder needs.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions under Goal 2 were effective in improving school culture and strengthening behavioral supports. Weekly PBIS-focused professional development reinforced expectations and supported teachers in implementing consistent classroom management strategies. This led to improved classroom environments and contributed to a stronger sense of shared responsibility for maintaining a positive school culture. While the training itself was effective, its overall impact was limited by the need for more applied practice. Teachers would benefit from additional opportunities to model and rehearse strategies to ensure consistent and confident implementation.

In the online program, expanded family engagement and communication systems improved responsiveness and strengthened relationships between families and program staff. Weekly parent meetings, enhanced communication efforts, and ongoing collaboration with the Online PSO provided valuable stakeholder feedback and reinforced the importance of maintaining strong community connections in the virtual setting. Mentoring cycles and collaborative staff structures also supported consistent implementation of program expectations and contributed to a more connected and supportive learning environment for scholars. Feedback from families emphasized that communication and relationship-building efforts positively supported scholar connectedness and engagement within the online program.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

For the 2026-27 school year, the site will continue its focus on PBIS and culture-building as foundational elements of scholar success. PD will be refined to include more opportunities for modeling, guided practice, and reflection on PBIS strategies. This will support deeper implementation and greater consistency across classrooms. The site will also continue reinforcing core values and shared expectations, while incorporating staff feedback to improve the effectiveness of training and ensure it translates into daily practice.

In the online program, several new strategies are planned to further strengthen scholar connectedness and family engagement during the 2026–27 school year. The program will host program-wide Back-to-School Night events to build stronger relationships between families, scholars, and staff at the beginning of the school year. The online program is also exploring the implementation of scholar-led conferences to increase scholar ownership, engagement, and family participation. Additionally, the program plans to continue expanding communication systems through increased use of text-based messaging and other engagement tools to improve responsiveness and accessibility for families. The addition of a full-time counselor will further support scholars' social-emotional and behavioral needs while helping strengthen school connectedness across the online program.

The family participation metric was removed after review of prior practice identified limitations in the calculation methodology. Future reporting will focus on total survey responses and stakeholder feedback trends.

Implementation of Goal 3 centered on improving scholar attendance through consistent outreach, incentives, and flexible academic supports. The site conducted regular family outreach calls to address attendance concerns and maintain communication with families. Monthly attendance incentives were established to recognize and motivate positive attendance behaviors. In addition, after-school credit recovery programs and short-term independent study options were implemented to support scholars in maintaining academic progress during periods of absence. To strengthen staff capacity, site personnel, including attendance clerks and administrative support staff, participated in county-led training focused on chronic absenteeism and continuous improvement practices. This training supported staff in analyzing attendance data more effectively, evaluating current systems and practices, identifying trends, and implementing more targeted interventions. These actions were implemented consistently and contributed to increased awareness of attendance expectations and available supports. A key challenge identified was the need for stronger early identification systems to proactively address attendance concerns before patterns become chronic.

In the online program, implementation efforts focused on increasing scholar engagement, accountability, and family connection to support consistent participation and reduce barriers to attendance. The online program strengthened communication systems through weekly parent meetings, expanded use of ParentSquare and text-based communication, and ongoing monitoring of family engagement with Canvas. Program staff also implemented an Academic Probation process to provide targeted accountability and intervention for scholars demonstrating concerns related to engagement or academic participation. Regular collaboration among administrators, lead teachers, and support staff allowed the program to monitor scholar participation trends and respond proactively to scholar needs. Challenges included maintaining consistent engagement and connectedness within the virtual learning environment, while successes included stronger communication systems and increased opportunities for targeted support and intervention.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions under Goal 3 were effective in improving attendance awareness, strengthening engagement, and supporting scholars in maintaining academic progress. Family outreach efforts improved communication and allowed the site to respond more directly to attendance concerns. Attendance incentives increased scholar motivation and reinforced positive attendance habits. Academic supports, including credit recovery and short-term independent study, helped prevent scholars from falling behind. Staff training on attendance and data analysis

improved the site's ability to use data to guide decision-making and evaluate existing practices. As a result, interventions became more strategic and better aligned to identified needs. While these actions were effective, their overall impact was limited by the timing of some interventions. Without a fully developed early identification system, some attendance issues were addressed after patterns had already developed, indicating a need for more proactive systems.

In the online program, increased communication systems and targeted intervention processes improved the program's ability to monitor and respond to scholar engagement concerns. The implementation of Academic Probation provided additional accountability structures and intervention supports for scholars needing increased participation and academic monitoring. Feedback from parents and the Online PSO reinforced the importance of communication and relationship-building in promoting school connectedness and scholar engagement. Expanded monitoring of Canvas participation and communication responsiveness also helped staff identify scholars needing additional support more effectively. These efforts contributed to a stronger system for addressing barriers to engagement and attendance within the online setting.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

For the 2026-27 school year, the site will continue all current attendance strategies while implementing key refinements to improve effectiveness and timeliness. A primary focus will be strengthening early identification systems for scholars at risk of chronic absenteeism. The site will implement more proactive monitoring practices to identify at-risk scholars earlier and provide timely intervention. Family outreach, attendance incentives, and academic support options will be maintained and refined to ensure interventions are targeted and responsive. In addition, the site will continue strengthening data analysis practices and refining systems based on ongoing evaluation to ensure consistent use of attendance data to guide decision-making. These adjustments are intended to improve the site's ability to reduce chronic absenteeism and support sustained scholar engagement.

In the online program, several refinements are planned to further strengthen scholar engagement, connectedness, and consistent participation during the 2026–27 school year. The program will continue expanding family communication systems, including increased use of text-based messaging and engagement monitoring tools. Program-wide Back-to-School Night events and the exploration of scholar-led conferences are intended to strengthen scholar ownership and family connection to the school community. Additionally, the hiring of an additional full-time counselor will provide increased support for scholars' social-emotional, behavioral, and engagement needs. The online program will also continue refining data analytics and monitoring systems through the use of Intelligent Insights reporting tools to better identify patterns related to engagement, participation, and intervention needs within the virtual learning environment.

Based on implementation, the metric measuring EL and SED participation in before and after school programs was removed due to challenges in consistently tracking participation data for these subgroups.
